During the year 2015-16, the Children's Home housed 205 children in 12 months, out of whom 83 were either restored with their families or transferred to other homes and 21 were found missing or ran away from the Shelter Home. 99 new children were admitted to the Shelter Home on the recommendations of the Child Welfare Committee during the year and the average monthly stay of the children in the Shelter Home has been 109.

As soon as a child arrives in the campus of Bal Sahyog Children's Home, health checkup and counseling is started with proper nutrition and plan for his education and rehabilitation. In the beginning, the child is provided education in NFE center and then, as per his age and aptitude, he is admitted to formal school.

It is significant to mention that during the academic year 2015-16, the result of Bal Sahyog Children in class X and XII in Central Board of Secondary Education has been 100% with the topper in Class X Board securing 71 % marks and the topper of Class XII board securing 84% marks. All the 16 children who appeared in the board examination qualified the exams with minimum 53% marks, 1 child (Ravi) got admission in Aurobindo college in commerce stream and another child (Vijay) got admission in Shaheed Bhagat Singh college of Delhi University in political science honors.

As shown above, the children from Bal Sahyog are provided regular health checkup. In one year, during 2015-16, 5514 times diagnosis of cases of children has been carried out by doctors and nurse as stated above. The referral cases to other hospitals have been 134 times. Some children are referred once and some more than 3 or 4 times depending upon the frequency and nature of disease. Most of the children who come to Bal Sahyog are street children, orphan, underprivileged and vulnerable and have poor health. They are provided supplementary diet, tonics and vitamins to improve their health. One child, Rahul Tiwari S/o Hira Lal, was operated appendix septomy at Kalawati Hospital, otherwise there has been no serious disease noticed among any child this year due to good health services and vigilant efforts of the team managing the Home.

It is significant to mention that this initiative has saved the childhood of the children from poor and underprivileged section of the society. In NFE and Remedial classes all children who are either school dropouts or non-entrants in the age group of 8 to 12 years are provided condensed education and admitted in the nearby government school as per their age.

Impact of the programmes by Bal Sahyog:

1. Children in Bal Sahyog Children's Home have received a safe, creative and learning environment that has helped them to attain optimum physical, mental, ethical and spiritual development.
2. Academic performance of these children from Children's Home has improved and all the children who appeared in Xth and XIIth CBSE Board Exam have passed the said exam with topper securing 85% marks.
3. Out of 18 children who attained 18 years of age 11 were rehabilitated with their families and the remaining 7 were provided jobs after vocational training through UNNATI.
4. Out of 18 underprivileged students supported through private tuition in different slums of Delhi, 6 (33%) students have secured above 70% marks and 4 (25%) secured above 80% marks in the CBSE examination in class X and XII.
5. 1399 youth and women have been provided vocational training, 548 were either placed in jobs or self-employed and 373 admitted in NIOS for advanced training during the year 2015-16. More than 90% of these trainees are female.
